HIGHLIGHTS FROM CHURCH COUNCIL

At a Special General Meeting in 2018, we as a congregation unanimously supported a resolution in favour of ordaining both men and women, a resolution that was later tabled at Synod with the backing of many other congregations. Six years later, Synod voted in favour. That we at GGLC should have such a single-minded view has perhaps made our navigation through this issue look like plain sailing, where other congregations have had stormy times and there have been a few shipwrecks along the way. Even now there are congregations that are working to tear themselves off from the LCA rather than fit within the Way Forward framework that allows either practice—that is, to have a male pastor only or being open to either a male or female.

The lead up to the 2024 Synod did present challenges for our call process, as we found that pastors were somewhat preoccupied and awaiting the outcome of the ordination vote before being willing to consider a call. After our call to Pastor Mat von Stanke in the middle of the year was declined, the Call Team started working on the next round of calling, but before making much progress—on the advice of the District Office—went into hiatus pending the Synod outcome.

Whilst the Call Team has now resumed and is working on having a recommendation for a Call Meeting with the Half Yearly Meeting, the task of finding a pastor who would be the right fit for GGLC has become a little more difficult—a proportion of pastors available for call have made it clear one way or another that they are aligned with the practice of ordination of men only and would not fit in with our thinking at GGLC. At some stage God will open the door to the right person—male or female—and in the meantime we continue to be blessed by the ministry of our six young adult lay preachers and various visiting pastors.

As we are now just over one year into vacancy, we are looking at ways that we can make the current model of lay preaching more sustainable, including having an interim part time pastor and some form of recompense for the lay preachers. Discussion on this will be included in the HYM.

As we look to employ a full time pastor again in hopefully the not-toodistant future, the predicted shortfall in offerings remains a concern particularly since we also want to minimise the amount we need to borrow to finish off the manse. At the Finance Team Meeting in mid November, it was predicted that we will be \$17,000 short—in excess of 10% of the offerings budget—at the end of this year. Overall we are looking at a deficit of around \$7500 on the total budget, not quite as bad as the offerings shortfall since our salary expenses were lower than estimated, due to the ongoing vacancy. We do still continue to pay for a portion of pastor's salary (into the LCA Transfer Fund), which started at 90% at the beginning of the vacancy and will drop to 50% in the second year.

The budget for the manse build is on track. To make the final payment it is expected that we will draw down on an LLL loan that was recently approved, for \$70,000. We expect to borrow about \$50,000, but have some contingency in there. Although this is better than the \$110,000 loan we had when we started the manse sale/build process, \$50,000 is a bit of a lukewarm sum for a loan and as we get closer to the final payment we may explore whether we can wipe it off completely by drawing on savings and an appeal. Being free of loan repayments will ease the burden in future budgets.

It's been quite a busy time with the fete, call process, various other meetings and demanding bits of paperwork in the last couple months, so I'm taking an early minute on writing this article and have leant on ChatGPT to finish it off for me (and it hasn't done too bad a job): As we continue to navigate the challenges and opportunities ahead, we are reminded of the faithfulness of our congregation and the commitment we share in serving God's mission. Though there are uncertainties, especially in calling the right pastor and managing our financial needs, we trust that God will guide us through this season. Together, with prayerful hearts, we can lean into His provision, confident that He will provide the leadership and resources we need to move forward as a vibrant and united community of faith. Let us keep our eyes fixed on Him as we embrace the journey ahead.

We have continued to see our students enjoying school and achieving amazing things, with the last few terms bringing events including IPSHA Junior Orator, debating, Children's University graduation, basketball, netball and AFL competitions, and our number of futsal (indoor soccer) teams growing along with weekly netball and basketball. We've seen a regular weekly dance group commence from Term 3 which has been incredibly popular, as well as our school band, woodwind and brass ensembles grow immensely from their beginning back in Term 2. We are really blessed to have an amazing group of students at the school who have the enthusiasm to engage with the range of opportunities presented to them and make the most of their God given gifts and talents.





HOUSE WANTS A PASTOR EPISODE 3

As it says in Matthew 7:24 "the wise man built his house on concrete footings continuously trenched or piered 200 into firm natural ground, or 200 into certified compacted fill"





Steps Under Construction




But before we talk about footings, in the last issue you were promised some steps. To recap, after the building contract was signed in mid-November 2023 and Development Approval received in December, we had the task to complete several retaining walls in time to publish our feats in the May edition of *Life in the Vine*, which we did with a team of slave labour and a little professional help. Shortly after that we added some steps at the end of one of the retaining walls so that pastor could step out of the alfresco area and safely venture down the hill. That was the last thing we squeezed in before handing the site over to the builder, who immediately did nothing for months.

Benching of the block started in mid July and was completed in under 3 days, the excess soil going to backfill the retaining wall on the boundary.

Here I must interject that over 50 years ago, Taiichi Ohno developed the Just-In-Time (JIT) manufacturing philosophy in Toyota's vehicle manufacturing plants in Japan. JIT results in delivery of a product at the rate and time that the customers need it. One of the pillars of JIT is the elimination of waste, which comes in seven forms, one of which is waiting time. This deserves a mention as it seems no-one in the Australian construction industry has yet heard of or thought of adopting JIT such that trades could be working on site contiguously to complete the work in weeks instead of years. Back to the main plot, several weeks passed. Then the footings contractor started and showed promising progress, digging a whole three holes in one week (yes three whole holes). The breakneck pace continued and six weeks after starting, the footings were complete.









Several weeks rolled by, during which time an examination of the footings would have revealed that from deep within the bowels of the layers of concrete and steel, several pipes emerge at the outer edges, their purpose being left to the imagination of the reader to flush out. Eventually the drainage contractor arrived, did his business, and was gone again in about three days after discretely burying it all like a cat does. I doubt that contractors in this line of work live very glamorous lives, but their service to society should not be underestimated.







8am Tuesday, Carpenters Arrive


But then the chippies turned up - not the crinkle cut or salty old vinegary types, but a highly drilled army of carpenters, and they nailed it then bolted—from nothing, to something that looks like a house in 4 days (insert triumphant cries).

The JIT concept had still attracted nobody's attention as the one year anniversary of contract signature approached relentlessly like a dark shadow creeping over the bleak grey slab and the unglamorous pipes (ominous music playing).

This brings us to the second milestone payment. Remarkably, the average time between a contractor leaving and the next arriving is counted in weeks, whilst the average time between a contractor leaving and an invoice arriving is counted in seconds. To get this far has cost around \$200,000 (including retaining walls).

Bricks, roofing, gutters and fascia materials have been delivered to the site, so watch this space... I'm sure it will all be ready Just-In-Time for our new pastor...

What is the most exciting adventure that you have ever been on?

We were in Scotland and my Dad wanted to show us something that was off of the side of the highway. What spiritual gift do you "earnestly desire" (1 Corinthians 14:1)?





FISH COOKING NIGHT - Saturday 18th May

GGAF members and friends were treated to an excellent night of cooking and entertainment in the Golden Grove Lutheran Worship Centre. Attendance totalled 78 including Master GGAF Chef Geoff Thiel and wife Julianne Polner, who together with Jack, Lauren and Ash Thiel all participated in the cooking and demonstrations on the night. Geoff demonstrated how to Pickle Fish (in vinegar) which led to preparation of a German Whiting Salad. The last dish was Indian Amitsari Fish with Yoghurt Dipping Sauce with flathead. Lauren entertained the crowd with fishing humour and anecdotes.

A copy of each recipe was provided for attendees. Door prizes were drawn during the evening including a donated fish plate and fishing gear.

Special thanks to Mark Rawolle for set up and operation of cameras (including overhead for watching cooking process on the big screen) and microphones thereby creating a very professional night.



The 2024 Senior Champion trophy was presented to Graeme Hoklas and Junior Champion trophy to Letty Sweeney.


